What Can We Learn?

Regardless of your political views, you have to be frustrated and discouraged by the recent proceedings with regard to Brett Kavanaugh and his nomination to the Supreme Court. It is truly a sad testament to the depths of depravity to which we have sunk as a culture, where truth, morality, and right no longer seem to matter. Without getting into the politics and particulars of this embarrassing debacle that we are watching unfold, let me ask this question: what can we, as Christians, learn about our world and our lives from these events? Consider these few things:

- We live in a fallen world. This is not a new revelation by any means, but these events certainly provide a powerful reminder of this truth. This world is one in which sin exists and Satan is active. While we do not like this fact, we must acknowledge it and be diligent in protecting ourselves and fighting against its effect in our own lives (1 Peter 5:8-9).
- We must guard our lives carefully. While the debate rages over whether the accusations against Kavanaugh are true or false, I cannot help but wonder how much difference it would have made if he could have offered irrefutable evidence that his life choices had been such that the types of activities he was being accused of were not even within the realm of possibility. You see, we are taught by God to live "blameless" lives, which does not mean perfect but does mean that the character and conduct of our lives are such that no legitimate accusation can be brought against us (Philippians 2:14-16). Furthermore, we are encouraged to live so that, even if a false accusation is brought against us, the character of our lives quickly proves that accusation to be false and causes our enemies to be put to shame (Titus 2:7-8).
- God knows the truth. While much has been made, in this case, about the fact that no one truly knows the truth about events that took place so long ago, so that we are forced to decide who we will believe based only on their word, we do not have to worry about such subjective judgment when it comes to God's appraisal of our lives. In the only judgment that truly matters, we can be sure that the truth will prevail and that, God's judgment will be just.

Outreach News—Pat Cowden

When undertaking an effort to evangelize locally, we must first develop a strategy. If we do not, our efforts will be stilted and less than optimum. Before we plan a strategy, it is important to understand the world and the specific community we live in. Many Christians become frustrated when their efforts do not produce the results they did back in "the good old days."

We have to come to grips with the fact that we do not live in those days anymore. We live in a constantly changing culture that has shifted in regards to beliefs about the bible. 40 years ago in our country a lot of people, perhaps a sizable majority, believed in the Bible to some extent or another. That is no longer the case, which means we have to start our relationships with contacts from a different perspective or starting point. We simply cannot assume that there is any regard or reverence for God's Word anymore.

This shift means that we need to reconsider how we approach and what we initially say to people. So, what should we do? We need to proceed slowly. We need to till the soil before we sow the seed. We need to try to reveal or initiate spiritual interest. Then, any time a spark of interest is seen, we need to follow up with additional conversations of a spiritual nature. Today's world, at least in the USA, is one which requires permission for everything including and maybe especially for religious topics. It is our job to uncover or generate enough interest to get permission from folks to share our beliefs with them. It is definitely a process, and can be a slow one at that. Sometimes things click perfectly and proceed quickly but more often than not they do not. Patience and prayer are valuable tools for local evangelism.

Evangelism challenge:

Have you been praying for one or more of your neighbors that you believe might be a good prospect for the gospel? We are going to be talking about those contacts within the next week or so. Please engage in this prayerful effort to open the hearts of some of those we already have some type of relationship with.


