Make Me A Servant

In John chapter 13, on the night before His crucifixion, Jesus gave His apostles a powerful example and lesson about the importance of being a servant. Imagine that scene: the Son of God—the One who was present at the creation and instrumental in the forming of mankind; the One who had been with God and was God (John 1:1) and who would soon return to God to be seated at His right hand, having been given all authority in heaven and on earth (Matthew 28:18); the One who was preparing to offer His body, His blood, and His life as a sacrifice for sin in order to redeem mankind to God—kneeling before his friends and followers to wash their feet! Following that humble display of service, Jesus said to them, “Do you know what I have done to you? You call Me Teacher and Lord, and you say well, for so I am. If I then, your Lord and Teacher, have washed your feet, you also ought to wash one another’s feet. For I have given you an example, that you should do as I have done to you...” (John 13:12-15)

We sometimes sing a song that contains the line, “Make me a servant.” Unfortunately, all too often, we are unwilling to take up the mantle of service. Going back to the scene from John 13, as you read the words of Jesus above, don’t overlook the fact that Jesus performed this act of service during their meal together. Ordinarily, the washing of feet would have been done upon their arrival and before they sat down to eat, but with no hired servant there to fulfill the task, no one took it upon themselves to serve. It certainly would not have been missed by the apostles that their feet had not been washed as this was a normal and expected tradition of the time. I can only imagine that there were possibly murmurings and complaints among the apostles that there was no one there to perform this menial task. Yet, none of the apostles was willing to fill the role. How often do we find ourselves in that situation—complaining that no one is doing something that needs to be done but unwilling to take it upon ourselves to serve in that way?

As we enter the month of March, our focus area within our overall theme is shifting. As we continue to explore our theme of **I AM THE CHURCH**, we want to focus on the fact that, as the church, **I Am A Servant of Christ**. May God help us to be reminded of the importance of service and to have the heart of a servant as we strive to shine as lights in this world to the glory of God.
