Be The Change

During our week at Maywood, I get to work with a special activity designed to help the kids think about their Christian lives and how to be a greater influence in their world. This year, our theme for that program was "Be the Change" and it dealt with ways that they could use their lives to bring positive change to the world. Each morning we discussed a different element of their spiritual lives that, if applied, could help them to "be the change." I would like to share a brief overview of those things with you because I think that there is an application for all of us in these points.

There is no doubt that there are many ways in which our world has gotten off-track. In our own society, it seems that God and faith have been relegated to the shadowy corners of our world, if not banished altogether. As Christians, we worry about what our future holds and wonder what might be done to turn our world around, though we often feel helpless to bring about any real change. The reality is that there are many things that Christians and churches can and should be doing to bring about positive change in our world, but let me suggest that, before we begin any active efforts, we must first make these individual commitments in our own lives. In order to "be the change" that we want to see in the world, we must:

Be Real. If we are to be God's own special people, proclaiming His praises in this world (1 Peter 2:9-10), our faith and Christian lives must not be simply an act that we put on when it is convenient or expected. The praise, love, and devotion that we express to God on the Lord's Day must be genuinely lived out every day of the week. The sincerity of our relationship with Christ must be evident to the world.

Be Different. Jesus has called us to be lights to a dark world, illuminating and bringing glory to God (Matthew 5:14-16). The simple fact of the matter, though, is that we cannot make a difference in the world if we are unwilling to be different from the world. In our attitudes, words, and actions, we must be willing to stand out and let our lights shine.

Be the Example. Our world is full of followers. Those who "go along to get along." What we really need is more people who are willing to stand up and lead by showing the world what a faithful life looks like. Both among the saved and in the world, faithful Christians need to be leading the way by their example of faithfulness and service to God.

<u>Be Courageous</u>. The truth of the matter is that being the change that needs to happen in our world is not always easy. It can cause us to stand out, face ridicule, and forfeit some of the comforts of this world. We must have courage to face the challenges of faithfulness, remembering that God is always with us (Heb. 13:5-6).

School is back in session for most of our Chase Park teens. Our college age students will be heading back in the next couple of weeks as well.

I must admit, I have a love-hate relationship with back-to-school time. I always miss the time summer break allows with my family, friends, and the teenagers at Chase Park. There is no other time of the year that the teens and I have the ability to have such concentrated time together. At the same time, there is no other time of year that my four little ones have concentrated time together. Since both of those things are true, it is always difficult to say goodbye to summer break.

At the same time, there is a small part of me that looks forward to school being back in session.

Summer is a time where, for the most part, our family "schedule" is out the window. There is something to be said about being on a schedule and having a routine. When you have a routine you know what is coming next, you know what to expect. Routine is a good thing!

One thing we must be careful as Christians is to never allow our relationship with Jesus to become "routine." There is a very real danger in allowing our Christianity to become just another "activity" or box to check on our list of things to do for the week. It is easy to get into the dangerous mindset that thinks that as long as we are sitting in the pew at the appointed time, we are doing all that is required for our relationship with Jesus.

No doubt that Sunday morning, Sunday nights, and Wednesday

nights should be part of our routine, they are special times in which we come together. We must be on guard against the idea that those time periods are the only thing required in our Christianity. We miss out on so many blessings if we allow our Christianity to be something routine.

I want to challenge each of us with something. Let each of us keep guard against allowing our Christian lives to become just something we "do." Christianity is who we are, not a routine activity we engage in three times a week. "And let us not grow weary of doing good, for in due season we will reap, if we do not give up" Galatians 6:9.

Demonstrate Hospitality Towards Those Visitors Who Do Attend

As we continue to look at increasing opportunities to share the Gospel, this would apply to all visitors, whether they were invited by you, someone else, or are simply "walk-ins." Some "action steps" might include: Greeting them, letting them know they are welcome, inviting them home or out for a dinner or snack, or calling or visiting them after they have attended the services.

Showing such love towards those who may even be "strangers" is the true meaning of hospitality, a virtue that ought to characterize Christians (Hebrews 13:2; Romans 12:13b). Plus, in doing such things, you are preparing their hearts for the gospel! How? By demonstrating love as a congregation of Christians they will be more

likely to believe in the love of God demonstrated in the life of Christ! (1Pet. 2:11-12).

Finally, we are ready for the most important step in all our efforts, SEE THAT THEY HAVE AN OPPORTUNITY TO HEAR THE GOSPEL. Ideally, this will come AFTER witnessing a demonstration of the gospel in our lives, by our love, hospitality, both as individuals and as a congregation.

If you feel confident in discussing it with them, then approach them yourself and suggest some sort of Bible study. Either of these two suggestions are effective: 1) A Bible study with them in their home (using aids like video tapes, charts, or simply an open Bible), or 2) That they study on their own with the aid of a Bible correspondence

course, or by viewing a video Bible study series (like Jule Miller's "Visualized Bible Study Series").

If you do not feel you are yet confident in approaching them concerning a study, or in conducting it yourself, there is still much good that you can do. Bring it to the attention of members who are able and willing to teach. Provide opportunities for the teacher and the prospect to become better acquainted, and the teacher can take it from there.

Christ's mission was to seek and save the lost. Are we following His example?
