# When An Unwavering Faith Wavers (Part 3—Peter)

Over the last two weeks we have considered two different struggles that so many of us face from time to time that can cause even the most unwavering of faiths to waver. **Doubt**, as seen in the life of Abraham, can cause us to question the presence and promises of God during the trying times of our lives and lead us to attempt to take control of our own lives instead of trusting in God's perfect plan. **Discouragement**, as seen in the life of Elijah, can cause us to feel defeated and hopeless and want to simply give up in our fight against Satan and his attacks. In the final installment of this short series, I would like to mention one more obstacle to our faith and see an example of how this struggle can affect our faith.

When we consider the life of the apostle Peter, we see some moments of greatness concerning his faith in Jesus. It was Peter who declared, on at least two occasions, his confident belief in Jesus as the Son of God (Matthew 16:16; John 6:69). It was also Peter who swore his undying devotion to Christ shortly before Jesus' arrest in the Garden of Gethsemane (Matthew 26:31-35). It may have been the overconfidence of Peter in his own strength and courage that led him into temptation that night, for shortly after making that claim, he found himself in a precarious situation doing the very thing that he had said he would never do: denying his Lord. What was it that caused Peter's faith to waver? **Fear**. The fear of being all alone in the crowd; the fear of facing the wrath of an angry mob. The fear of the possibility of meeting the same fate that Jesus seemed destined for. In the face of these fears, Peter's unwavering faith wavered, his confidence waned, and his strength wilted. In that moment, a battle raged in Peter's heart between fear and faith, and fear was victorious.

Fear continues to be a powerful obstacle to the faith of God's people. We may fear the consequences of standing up for our faith, the negative opinions of others, the disappointment of failure, or the sting of ridicule. Whatever our fears, those things can have a profound effect on even the strongest of faiths, causing us to shrink from responsibility and avoid opportunity. Maintaining and living out an unwavering faith is not an easy task. There are enemies and obstacles that threaten to derail it at every turn. May God help us to be strong and to continually grow in our faith.

Do you believe it? Do you really believe it? You likely do it regularly, but do you believe in its power? Has it become a matter of routine or obligation or do you still believe in its purpose?

The power of prayer is absolutely amazing. Prayer is our avenue of communication with God the Father. It is in prayer we make our requests, our needs, and our desires known to Him (Philippians 4:6).

One of the difficulties we often face in our prayer lives is our lack of belief in its power. The lack of belief does not always manifest itself in the same way. We can struggle to believe that God can answer our prayers. We can struggle to believe that God will answer our prayers. We can

struggle to believe that God hears our prayers. There are many ways our lack of belief in the power of prayer can rear its ugly head.

When our faith in our prayer life struggles, we must be like the father whose son had a demon found in Mark chapter 9. Jesus told him, "Everything is possible for one who believes" (Mark 9:23). Do you remember the father's answer? The father said to Jesus, "I believe; help my unbelief" (Mark 9:24)!

If our faith is struggling, ask God to help! It seems like when our faith struggles, we often do exactly the opposite of asking God to help. When our faith is struggling, our prayer life is usually the first thing to suffer. We don't spend time with God in

prayer like we know that we should. If we do spend time in prayer when our faith is struggling, it is often brief or somewhat empty. When we find ourselves facing a faltering faith, that's one of the times when we should be praying the hardest!

Please do not allow your prayer life to become one of obligation or routine. If our prayer lives suffer, our relationship with God suffers. Guard against the temptations of Satan of allowing yourself to become too busy or too tired to pray. If life gets too busy to pray, it's time to slow down.

Do you believe in its power? Do you believe in God's ability to hear you? Do you believe in God's ability to answer? Don't give up, keep praying.

# Do Things Which Make For A Caring Congregation

As we continue looking to increase opportunities to share the Gospel, this suggestion is important if our efforts in evangelism are going to be fruitful in the long run. First, because it helps to confirm our claim to be true disciples of Jesus Christ (notice John 13:35). Correct doctrine and worship, etc., are certainly important; but it is our love for one another that the Lord intended to convince the world that we are truly His disciples!

Second, our love makes us useful to the Lord! From Revelation 3:7-8, we learn that the Lord knows the true condition of His churches, and that He will "open doors" for those that can be useful to Him. We are assured that if we are a church that can be used by Him to reach others with the gospel and nurture them in their spiritual growth, then He will

"open doors" for us as well!

But suppose we are not a place where new Christians can grow spiritually in an atmosphere of love? Do we think that the Lord will use His providence to lead us to souls who are seeking for the truth? Even if we did reach souls for Christ, would they receive the spiritual nourishment necessary to remain faithful and strong in the Lord's service?

And finally, it is important to practice hospitality toward Christians because it prepares us for the kind of personal work that is the most effective in leading others to Christ. I am referring to "friendship" or "relationship" evangelism, which requires a willingness to be hospitable and giving to those we are trying to reach. If we are unable (or unwilling) to practice hospitality towards our brethren, what makes us think we will practice it toward the lost?

So the first thing to do is make sure that as a church we provide the right kind of loving and caring spiritual environment. Here are some "action steps" that one can take: Make it a point to get to know ALL the members and regular visitors by name; practice "hospitality" toward the members and regular visitors (1Peter 4:8-9), invite them into your home, or out to eat, visit other Christians each week (especially the sick, shut-ins, new members, absent members). When a congregation is filled with loving members who care for its own, then I believe it is ready to be used by the Lord to reach out and care for others!

#### "Why do you not understand what I say?"

John 8:43

A question about the reasons for unbelief

Jesus poses this question to the religious leaders of His day—those who believed in God and were, at least outwardly, committed to keeping the law. However, they had fallen victim to their own envy, greed, and hard-heartedness and had rejected Jesus and His teaching. Their unbelief had caused them to close their ears, their minds, and their hearts to the Son of God. We see this same kind of unbelief all around us in the world today. Many have rejected Jesus altogether because they have been convinced that He is a fraud or, at least, of no consequence to their lives. Others, because of fear, pride, greed, or worldliness, have refused to allow Jesus to be their Lord. Unbelief is a problem of epidemic proportions in our world today and the causes of that unbelief are many. If we, as ambassadors for Christ, hope to reach those who have succumbed to unbelief, it is helpful for us to understand the reasons behind that unbelief. I hope that you will be here this Wednesday as Steve Hale leads us in a study of this important question and topic.
