Casting Stones John 8:1-11

She was a sinner, caught in the very act of adultery. There was no doubt concerning her guilt. Made a public spectacle as she was brought to Jesus, she was only a pawn in their game. She wasn't their true concern, He was. Their goal was to vilify, discredit, and accuse Jesus. What would He say? How would He respond? In all of their scheming, they never imagined that Jesus would react to them in the way He did. "He who is without sin among you, let him throw a stone at her first." It is not that Jesus was condoning her sin, for certainly He was not. His words to her, "go and sin no more," were a condemnation of her sinful actions, mingled with a compassionate call for her repentance. But Jesus knew the hearts of her accusers. He saw through the charade of their righteous indignation and understood their impure motives.

Jesus' lesson to them is one that we would all do well to learn from. It can become very easy for us to become righteously indignant toward the sins of others. We see their choices, their lives, and their attitudes toward God and recoil in anger and disdain at their ungodliness. Jesus' point is certainly not that we should condone or justify sin in the lives of others; rather He is reminding us that we must be very careful about condemning others while ignoring our own sinfulness. We must be ever mindful that Romans 3:23 applies to us as well. To judge others harshly and without compassion is to bring that same harshness of judgment against ourselves (Matt. 7:1-2). Our reaction to the sins of others must always be tempered by introspection and an awareness of our own sins.

So how should we respond to sin in the lives of others? As Jesus did—with love, compassion, and concern. We must not find joy or satisfaction in someone else's sinfulness, and likewise, we must not be filled with wrathful anger and unrighteous judgment. Sin, in our own lives and in the lives of others, is an occasion for sadness and sorrow. Our only desire should be to see the sinner restored and saved (Gal. 6:1). In that desire, we pray, we humble ourselves, and we act with compassion. As the old saying goes we "hate the sin, but love the sinner." May God help us to do so in a way that pleases Him.
